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## Pennsylvania Urban Nutrient Management

### Be Green While Protecting Our Streams

#### Protecting Pennsylvania's Waterways Starts at Home.



Turfgrass has become a major component of Pennsylvania's flora. In fact, according to DCNR, Pennsylvania now contains over 2 million acres of lawn. Selecting a proper turfgrass management program, whether it is on a private lawn, sports field, public park, or golf course, is essential to protecting our local waterways.

#### Know What Your Lawn Needs

When looking to apply nutrients to your lawn, make sure you are aware of what your lawn needs and what the Pennsylvania Fertilizer Law allows. To determine your lawn's nutrient needs, it is best to first soil test. Soil tests provide specific recommendations for nitrogen, phosphate, and potassium. Following the soil test recommendations ensures that you are applying only what your lawn needs, thus reducing nutrient loss and fertilizer cost. Test kits can be purchased for a nominal fee from your local Penn State extension office.

#### The Pennsylvania Fertilizer Law

In July 2022, Pennsylvania adopted a new fertilizer law designed to minimize the movement of nutrients into our waterways. Anyone who applies fertilizers should be aware of the following nutrient limitations.

- Nitrogen is limited to 0.9 pounds of total nitrogen and 0.7 pounds of available nitrogen per 1000 ft<sup>2</sup> per application.
- No phosphorus can be applied unless establishing or repairing turf.
- Both the nitrogen and phosphorus rates can be adjusted based on soil test recommendations and/or if using an enhanced efficiency fertilizer.
  - Enhanced efficiency fertilizers are specifically designed to reduce nutrient losses to the environment while increasing availability to plants.

In addition, when applying fertilizer, applicators must follow specific environmental conditions to prevent direct movement of fertilizer nutrients into our streams.

- Do not apply if a heavy rain is expected.
- Keep fertilizer away from drainage ditches, storm drains, or water.
- Maintain a 15-foot buffer from the banks of all waterways.

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Remove fertilizer that lands on impervious surfaces (i.e. driveways, sidewalks, roads) back onto the application area.

- Do not use as a snow or ice melt.
- Do not spread fertilizer on snow-covered or frozen ground.
- Fertilizer application between December 15 and March 1 is restricted to 0.50 lbs of total nitrogen per 1000 ft<sup>2</sup> per application.

**Read the Label**

Manufacturers of fertilizer products must include detailed labels that provide the nutrient content and instructions for use. As a fertilizer applicator, you are strongly encouraged to read and follow all directions and apply your fertilizer using a properly calibrated spreader.

**Lawn Care Considerations**

Nutrient management is not the only tool that can be used for limiting nutrient loss. There are many additional lawn care considerations that can be used to promote a healthy lawn while protecting our local waterways. A few examples are listed below.

Fertilizer may not be the solution. If your lawn is not looking as healthy and green as you would like, sometimes fertilizer is not the answer. Applying fertilizer without understanding the underlying soil can result in a waste of money and nutrients. There are many soil health factors that play a critical role in maintaining your lawn. Reducing soil compaction can improve root growth and water infiltration. Maintaining an appropriate soil pH is essential to promoting proper nutrient availability. Soil texture and organic matter content influence water movement, nutrient availability, and the microbial ecosystem of the soil. A healthy soil supports a healthy lawn.

Raise your mower deck. Set your mower deck to 3 inches or higher. A taller lawn provides shade that discourages weed growth and promotes strong root development helping lawns to withstand environmental stress. Alternatively, you can use low mow turf species, such as fine fescue blends, that do best when mowing is limited. A taller, healthier lawn slows water movement and increases infiltration keeping moisture, soil, and nutrients where they are needed most.

Mulch your grass clippings. Keeping your clippings in place returns valuable organic matter and nutrients to your lawn.

Provide a buffer. Do not mow up to the banks of streams. Maintaining vegetative buffers along waterways provides wildlife habitat while slowing and filtering water before it enters the stream.

Convert your lawn. Replacing turf with native vegetation not only increases water infiltration, but also promotes biodiversity and creates habitats for pollinators and other wildlife. For more information on Lawn Conversion visit DCNR's website.

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# Moving in, within or out of Lehigh Township?

Moving permits are required for anyone over the age 18; when moving in, out or within the Township. This ensures that we have the most updated information for your property and for tax roll purposes.

Moving permit applications can be found on the Township website, [www.lehightownship.com](http://www.lehightownship.com), under the forms and documents tab. You can pick up the permit application at the Township office or if requested, it can be mailed out to you. Moving permit applications should be returned to the Township office at 1069 Municipal Road, Walnutport, PA 18088, along with payment in the amount of \$5.00, cash or check payable to Lehigh Township.

Lehigh Township does not require a new Certificate of Occupancy for the resale of existing residential properties; however, the moving permit is required.

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

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## A REMINDER FROM YOUR TAX COLLECTOR

Hello everyone!

By now everyone should have received their 2024 Lehigh Township Real Estate tax bill (if you are a property owner) and Lehigh Township Per Capita tax bill. If you did not receive your tax bills, please call me (610-262-6222) so that I can duplicate the bill(s) and send it to you.

Many residents have escrows through their Mortgage Company for the payment of real estate taxes. Please, if you have an escrow account with your Mortgage Company, **DO NOT PAY YOUR REAL ESTATE BILL**. I send my entire Real Estate file to the mortgage service providers on your behalf so they have all the necessary information to pay your Real Estate tax in the discount period. Please note: mortgage companies do not pay per capita tax bills; residents must pay them on their own.

Just a reminder, residents receive two Per Capita tax bills a year. The Township has a \$5.00 Per Capita tax bill that is mailed in February and the School District (paid to Keystone Collections) has a \$10.00 Per Capita tax bill that is mailed in July. If you didn't receive a Lehigh Township Per Capita tax bill, please let me know so that I can put you on the tax roll. It is every RESIDENTS' obligation to receive this tax, if they reside in Lehigh Township and are over the age of 18. If you ever want to apply for a pistol permit, it is required that you have a stamped PAID copy of this bill in

order to receive your permit.

This year your Real Estate tax bill looks different. It includes a "Fire Service Tax", which was enacted to help support the replacement of equipment for our excellent fire company. The men and women are all volunteers who put their lives in danger when we call them for a fire, accident and all emergencies that they can help with. If anyone has any questions of the Fire Company, do not hesitate to contact them.

I have included an insert with the tax bills stating my hours and locations I will be available for payments. If you did not get one, please call me (610-262-6222).

I want to thank you so very much for your patience and understanding with all the misfortunes I experienced in 2023. I take full responsibility for everything that was late. The office staff at the Township is very competent and personable and was not responsible for my lateness. The depositing process was a new experience for me to make my work load lighter and I had trouble getting it right. 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# Lehigh Township Spring Leaf Collection

The Lehigh Township Public Works Department will conduct its spring curbside leaf collection program during the week of April 1. **Leaves must be placed at the road by April 1.** The Maintenance Department will be making a **onetime** pass on each Township Road beginning on April 1. Leaves shall be free of sticks or other materials and raked to the shoulder of the road for collection. Leaves shall be kept off of the roadways, shall not be placed near obstacles such as rocks, telephone poles, mailboxes, and trees. Please do not park vehicles in front of or on top of the piles of leaves. The Public Works Department has the right to refuse collection if there is inappropriate material mixed in the leaves.

In addition to the collection of leaves, the Maintenance Department will also be doing a curbside collection of brush during the week of April 1. **Brush must be kept separate from leaf material.** Brush shall be cut in lengths not to exceed 3 feet and bundled in a manner that will not exceed 15 pounds.

Residents are also welcome to bring leaves and brush to the yard waste recycling area located across from the Maintenance Department Building. **Please: brush, leaves, and yard waste only.** Foreign objects that get caught in the grinder can cost thousands of dollars in repairs. Keep brush to lengths of no more than 6 feet and 8 inches in diameter. Stumps are not permitted. **Ornamental grass, straw and hay are not acceptable items for the yard waste site.**



## What does the Township do with all the leaves and brush?

The materials that are collected by the Public Works Department along with the material dropped off at the yard waste site are transported to the First Regional Compost Authority on Weaversville Road. At that site, the leaves are made into compost and the brush is made into double ground mulch. Both products are then returned to the Township yard waste site and made available to the residents without charge. Residents may also pick up this material along with single ground mulch at the First Regional Compost Authority. Remember, the better the material going into the product, the better the product is that is returned to the residents.

## Mandatory Recycling

Residents are reminded that Lehigh Township is a mandated recycling community. Paper, newsprint, aluminum, steel, plastics, and glass must be recycled.

# Best Buy TV Recycling

Best Buys in PA are currently accepting TVs: **fees apply**. Customers will receive a \$30 Best Buy gift card for reimbursement of the store drop-off fee.

- no larger than 49" for flat screens: \$29.99
- no larger than 31" for tube TVs: \$29.99
- There is a limit of two items per day (two televisions or two monitors; or one of each);
- Best Buy branded televisions and monitors (**Dynex** or **Insignia**) will be accepted at no charge;
- Televisions and monitors of other brands will be accepted, but the resident will be charged **\$29.99** per television or monitor. Residents paying the collection fee will be issued a \$30 Best Buy Gift Card. Please note, this collection fee model is acceptable in accordance with Section 504 of the Covered Device Recycling Act (CDRA).

There is a haul-away option for larger TVs, **fees apply** (\$59.99 - \$199.99)



Did you know that Lehigh Township is a recycling mandated community? The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires Lehigh Township residents and businesses to recycle. Residents are required to recycle aluminum, glass, newsprint and yard waste (leaves, branches, etc.). Businesses are required to recycle aluminum, corrugated paper, high grade office paper and yard waste (leaves, branches, etc.).

The yard waste center located across from the Lehigh Township Public Works Building is for residents to drop off their yard waste only. Commercial entities and non-residents may take yard waste material to the main processing site at the First Regional Compost Authority (FRCA), 6701 Weaverville Road, Northampton. Commercial entities and non-residents dumping at the Lehigh Township site are subject to fines.

The yard waste material dropped off at our site is transported to the FRCA and ground into mulch and compost which is then returned back to the yard waste center for the residents to take for their use. Yard waste and leaves only will be accepted at the Lehigh Township Facility. Yard waste is items such as: tree branches up to 8 feet in length and 6 inches in diameter, hedge clippings, and Christmas trees. Unacceptable items are: bamboo, roots/root balls, stumps, dirt, stones, grass, ornamental grass, cattails, hay, straw, nuts, wood, and construction material.

The leaves, tree branches and hedge clippings are to be unloaded in their marked areas, do not put these items in

the green bins. The green bins are used for transportation of these materials to the FRCA site. \*\*\*Please be sure to secure and/or tarp all yard waste/mulch while transporting to and from the site in your vehicle. Should debris fall onto the Township Road, it is your responsibility to clean up the debris.

Grasscycling is the preferred method of dealing with grass clippings. To grasscycle, remove no more than 1/3 of the leaf tissue and leave the grass clippings on the lawn after mowing. This reduces the time, costs, and labor of bagging grass and returns valuable nutrients to the soil. A mulching mower will chop the grass into finer pieces than a standard mower allowing them to breakdown more quickly. Grass clippings decompose quickly, so they do not contribute to thatch. Although grasscycling is preferred and encouraged, the residents may take their grass in containers to the main FRCA site on Weaverville Road, on Wednesdays, Fridays, and the 1st & 3rd Saturday of the month. There is a \$1 per 32-gallon container charge. Access the FRCA website at; [www.frcauthority.org](http://www.frcauthority.org) for further information, regulations and fees.

Whether you are dropping off material at the Township or the FRCA site, make sure your load is free of any debris, garbage, foreign objects or tools you may have been using. Foreign objects in the grinder cause expensive repairs and reduce the quality of the material that gets returned to the residents. The better the material is going into the site, the better the material will be when it is returned to the site.

**Pet Fire Safety**



Pets give us comfort, friendship, and unconditional love. Our connection to them can be among the strongest relationships in our lives. But pets can cause fires. We need to be careful with pets in the home.

**SAFETY TIPS**

- Pets are curious. They may bump into, turn on, or knock over cooking equipment. Keep pets away from stoves and countertops.
- Keep pets away from candles, lamps, and space heaters.
- Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen on a fireplace and keep it in place.
- Keep pets away from a chimney's outside vents. Have a "pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) away from the fireplace. Glass doors and screens can stay dangerously hot for several hours after the fire goes out.
- Consider battery-operated, flameless candles. They can look and smell like real candles.
- Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through electrical cords. Have any problems checked by a professional.

**Pets and Wildfires**

Make sure pets are included in your family's wildfire evacuation plan. Build an evacuation kit for each pet in your household. Ensure each kit is a size and weight that can be quickly and easily loaded into a vehicle when packing to evacuate.



**FACT**

Pets or wild animals have a part in starting about 750 home fires per year. These involve cooking equipment, fireplaces and chimneys, space heaters, lamps, bulbs, wiring, and candles.

**SMOKE ALARMS**

- Have working smoke alarms on every level of the home. Test your smoke alarms at least once a month.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.
- Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

**St. Paul's One-Room Schoolhouse News:** On Saturday, November 4th LTHS held an Open House of the St. Paul's One-Room Schoolhouse in Indianland and a program called "Sharing One-Room School Memories". The school was open for 1 ½ hours and more than 30 people visited during that time. Our program about Northampton County and Lehigh Township one-room schools was presented by Joel Höffner and attendance was better than anticipated with almost 50 people present. A beautiful book compiled by Joel Hoffner and his team about the more than 300 historical schoolhouses in Northampton County has been completed and LTHS has our own copy in our library. Please visit us during our Open House hours and ask to see it!

**LTHS Open House 2024 Visitation Hours:** This year the Historical Center Museum will be open from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm on the Third Sunday of each month starting on April 21st and continuing through October. Come see the interesting items from your past (or your ancestors) on display around the museum. In addition to the Museum Open House, we will also have the St. Paul's One-Room Schoolhouse on the third Sunday during May, June and September from 1 pm to 4 pm. Come early and visit both on the same day during those months. There is no charge for admission.

**A Bit of History:** If you have never visited the Historical Centre Museum, we are located next to the Indian Trail Park in Pennsville at 3811 Lehigh Drive, Northampton. Our building was part of the original Indian Trail Park which was begun in 1929 by Samuel and William Solliday. Over the years this park also changed hands frequently. Later owners were families named Minnich, Kahle, Fenstermaker and Tuttle. Lehigh Township purchased the park in 1977. It was leased out to Saullo Amusements. In 1981 the park's swimming pool was filled in to create a miniature golf course. Indian Trail Park continued to operate as an amusement park until it finally closed around 1983.

The current home of the Lehigh Township Historical Centre Museum began as the Indian Trail Restaurant, a soda fountain and restaurant when it was constructed in 1929. It later became known as the Trading Post. During the 1930s a gas station was added in front along what is now Lehigh Drive. When the park was finally sold to Lehigh Township in 1977, the Trading Post was leased to several different businesses. The Trading Post became a game arcade until the amusement park closed in the mid-1980s. Later it became a garment factory in the late 1980s and subsequently a poultry store in the early 1990s. After that closed, the building was vacant and fell into disrepair until the Lehigh Township Historical Society leased it from the Township and rebuilt it on the footprint of the original building. Come visit our museum and see the wonderful building that is reconstructed in the likeness of the original 95 years ago.

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
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
